6/15: Exploration of Mars. Dr. Harold A. Geller is Associate Professor Emeritus, Physics and Astronomy, George Mason University will speak about forty years of exploration of the surface of Mars. On the 20th day of August, 1975, the Viking 1 spacecraft was launched into space towards Mars. On the 19th day of June, 1976, the Viking 1 spacecraft reached the planet Mars. The Viking 1 Lander was to set down on the surface of Mars for the bicentennial celebration in the USA. Unfortunately, due to the ruggedness of the original chosen landing site, the Viking 1 Lander did not land on the surface of Mars until July 20th, which marked the 7th anniversary since the landing on the Moon. The robotic arm of the Viking 1 Lander malfunctioned, and, in spite of an onboard computer with only 64K of RAM, the computer was re-programmed to extend the robotic arm so that on the 28th of July, 1976, we reached out and touched the surface of Mars. We discuss the exploration of the surface of Mars from the Viking mission in 1976 to the current Curiosity rover on Mars; and, the part it all played in my own life on Earth. The winners of the 2022 Oratorical Contest were truly outstanding this year, even more for contestants being in transition in learning in the public schools. Speaking on the topic "Staying Optimistic in Challenging Times," first place was awarded to Amelie Cohrssen, whose family hails



from Ukraine. Second place was awarded to Sean Memon, third place to Ainsley Meck, fourth place to Zach Dabrowski, and fifth place to Ananya Sinha. All speeches were particularly polished and well-delivered and determining the winners a real challenge. Each of the winners is receiving a scholarship check for their future education. Participation in the contest was so widespread that the winners went through a selection process before the actual contest. It began with 39 spirited contestants submitting 5-minute video speeches to the school Coordinator, Leah Graham-McFarlane, the 10th Grade English Teacher.



She then selected the best 20 contestants from the original 39 and forwarded their 20 video presentations to the Optimist Club. The judges, Tricia O'Hara and Richard Knight, viewed each of the 20 video presentations on a You Tube channel and voted on selecting the five most outstanding speeches. All
